Deepakshi Sharma

National Rail Museum New Delhi India

Dr. Deepakshi Sharma is currently working as a Museum Consultant at National Rail Museum (NRM), New Delhi. At the museum, her major role is carrying curatorial work of indoor and outdoor gallery and various exhibitions based on different themes as well as conservation of the Archival collection of NRM.

She did her graduation in History (Hons) from Delhi University followed by completing Masters in Conservation, Preservation and Heritage management from I.P. University by securing first rank with gold medal. She has also acquired a Doctorate degree from Department of Conservation, National Museum Institute, New Delhi, India.

She started her career by working as a conservator with Indian National Trust for Art and Cultural Heritage (INTACH), New Delhi for almost a year in 2010. Then she joined National Museum Institute where she dealt with various art conservation projects, organized handson conservation workshops/seminars and taught Masters Students (Art Conservation) for almost 8 years.

I have been involved in cultural heritage conservation for about 30 years. I trained in furniture making and traditional finishing in the late 1980s. Further training in furniture restoration was followed by an MA in furniture conservation from the V&A/RCA joint conservation programme, where I specialised in painted, japanned and lacquered surfaces on wood. In 1998 I joined the V&A as a Senior Furniture Conservator. I have always been involved in educating emerging heritage professionals and in 2015 moved to West Dean College. My background was originally a practicing conservator, specialising in wooden objects and decorative surfaces. I am now Subject Leader for the MA Collections Care and Conservation Management. A core part of the course is training our students in risk assessment as a tool for strategic decision-making - where and why to allocate limited resources in the most effective way to achieve their organisation's objectives. Each student must carry out a conservation risk assessment at their host organisation as part of their studies. Many also undertake a larger scale risk assessment for their final dissertation. In the past, the risk assessment training sessions have been run by external professionals. This is my key motivation for applying for this course - I am keen to develop my own expertise and begin to lead these sessions, using the West Dean collection as a teaching tool. In addition, the risk assessments undertaken as part of this training will support the management and care of the West Dean collection.
